In the mid 1960's there was a singing group called "The Medical Mission Sisters". They sang songs that had very catchy tunes. If I would start to sing some of their songs, more than likely you would recognize them OM THE and start to sing along.

I grew up with these songs. Listening to the vinyl spin on a machine that many children today would not recognize. The phonograph would spin the record and I would sing along.. I learned to play the songs on the piano. Eventually I learned to play them on the guitar too. I still have the old song book from those many years ago in my study. I pull it out and it brings back many memories.

One song I would like to share with you has this as the refrain:

Miriam Therese Winter wrote both the lyrics and composed the tune. She based the song on the events recorded in the Word of God found in Luke 17. Ten men with leprosy stood at a distance calling to Jesus to have pity on them. Jesus told them to go show themselves to the priests, which according to the Law is the way to be declared clean. On the way to the priests, the ten realize that they had been made clean. Their skin was restored. Healing was given them. One, turned

around and shouting praises to God, found Jesus and thanked him. All ten were cleaned. Only one returned and gave thanks.

Random Thoughts on Thankfulness

We're always hearing "sound bites" or seeing written articles about hunger in the world. It certainly should make us think. I'm sure that most of us have sufficient food for our needs. In fact, some of us may have more than enough. Even in our worst times, most of us have never gone to bed really,



really hungry; we have never had to watch a child die from starvation; we've never had to dig a hole in a dry riverbed to get a cup of water; we've never had to sleep on the ground out in the open (perhaps when we've gone camping, but certainly not because we had no other choice). Surely we are thankful for what we have.

And what about those roofs over our heads? Sometimes we take them for granted. After all, we've worked hard, made the mortgage payments, done the painting and fixing, the flower planting and grass mowing. We've earned it! But guess what, there are people out there who have worked just as hard, made mortgage payments just as big, painted and fixed, planted and mowed -- and they are homeless. Newspapers and magazines are full of articles about people losing their homes. And I'm not talking about the stereotype "Bowery bum" with the bottle in the brown paper bag. I'm talking about blue collar workers and white collar workers, people like you and like me -- people who have lost their jobs and as a result their homes. I'm talking about the two men that Jim and I saw along the highway close to Piqua several years ago -- the men carrying the sign that said "will work for food". A co-worker of mine talked to these same men at the Upper Valley Mall a few days later. She was so moved by their story that she gave them \$20 from her limited funds and she was in tears as she related their story to us back at the office. The men were from Michigan. Both had been blue collar workers there. Both had lost their jobs and then their homes. Both had applied for public assistance and been denied because they had no permanent address. They joined forces and came to Ohio, hoping for work. Talk about a

"catch 22" -- you have no home because you have no money; you can't get money because you have no home. Remember the saying, "There but for the grace of God go I"? Surely we are thankful for what we have.

There are young people the world over who have no adult to lead them, guide them, teach them right from wrong, teach them about hard work and sacrifice and the love of God. Most of us have at least one family member that has helped shape our lives. Perhaps I'm more fortunate than some because I've had several people. One was my great grandmother. She was a little old lady, no bigger than a minute, with a soft voice and her hair pinned up in a bun. She lived by herself in an old house in the country. She had a couple of chickens and a fair-sized kitchen garden. I look back now and wonder how she lived. Because, you see, this was before the days of retirement pensions and Social Security. She didn't have much in the way of material possessions to share, but she had lots of love to give **and** she taught me to shell peas. For her I'm truly thankful.

My grandfather Moore taught me to tell time and to tie my shoes. He taught me about creativity and resourcefulness. He also taught me, **IN NO UNCERTAIN TERMS** (after the fact) that I was not to cross the highway by myself. For him I'm thankful.

My other grandparents taught me what it meant to work together and help other people. I don't think it had anything to do with the fact that my grandfather's name was Martin Luther Shirley. I think it was just because they were good people. They were farmers, people who had crops to harvest and animals to butcher. I remember neighboring farmers coming to help -- women in the kitchen, men in the fields. They would all pitch in to finish the harvesting and threshing and the butchering and canning. The next day my grandparents would go to someone else's home and everyone would repeat the process. They didn't have much money to pass out, but they did have values that they passed on. For them I'm thankful.

Dad taught me to play softball. He never could teach me to catch a fly ball; but he sure taught me how to throw it in from center field when I finally got my hands on it Mom made my clothes when I was young and taught me how to sew for myself when I was older. They didn't have much money; but they did give time and care. For them I'm thankful.

We have washers and dryers to shorten our laundry time; we have dishwashers to keep us from having dishpan hands; we have microwave ovens to shorten our time in the kitchen; we have leaf blowers to eliminate raking and snow blowers to eliminate shoveling; we have air conditioners to keep us comfortable at home, at work and in our cars; we have TVs, VCRs, iPods, iPads and every electronic gadget imaginable to keep us from being bored. For all this we should be truly thankful.

We live in a country that has plenty of space for all of it's people, a country where people have opportunities--the opportunity to learn, to work hard and be the best that we can be. We live in a country where we have rights -- the right to say what we want (even to criticize our leaders) and, yes, the right to worship where and how we like. For this we should be truly thankful.

And we, all of us, have God. He has been good to us, providing us with all the people and the things that we need in our lives -- even to the point of giving up His own Son for us so that if we believe we will be saved. Surely we are thankful for Him and His sacrifice for us.
